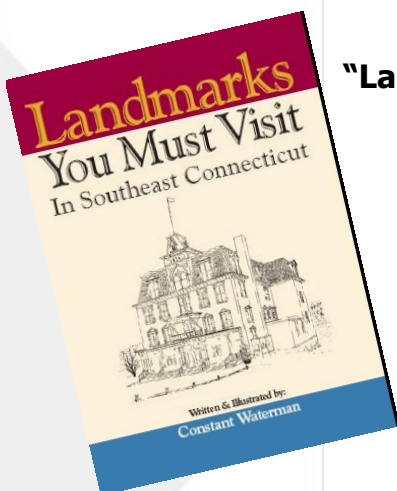
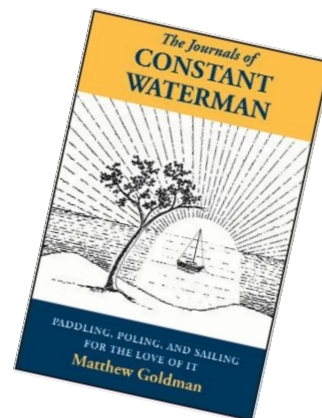


Author's Page ~ Constant Waterman
